Survey Conducted: October 1-8, 2017

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#### Methodology


- ✓ Survey of 600 Atlanta voters likely to cast a ballot in the November Mayoral primary survey
- ✓ Interviews were conducted via landline and cell phones
- ✓ Survey was conducted October 1-8, 2017
- ✓ The full sample margin of error is +/- 4.0% at the 95% confidence level
- ✓ The margin of error for population subgroups will be higher
- ✓ Some percentages do not sum to 100% due to rounding

# Voter Mood & Favorability Ratings

#### The Mayor has a better than two to one favorability rating and the City Council is also well-regarded by voters, whereas most hold an intense negative opinion of Trump.











# The November Primary Election for Mayor of Atlanta



#### **Candidate Profiles**



Vincent Fort is 61 years old, African-American, and lives in Southwest Atlanta. He was elected to the Georgia State Senate in 1996, where he led the fight for progressive values for two decades—passing the nation's toughest law against predatory lenders, and authoring legislation to create a state hate crimes law and increase support for minority-owned businesses.



Mary Norwood is 65 years old, white, lives in the city's northside with her husband, and is known for her work in the community and dedication to public service. She is currently serving her third term as a citywide member of the Atlanta City Council, where she has been an independent voice focused on solving problems to move Atlanta forward.



Peter Aman is 47 years old, white and lives in northwest Atlanta. He is not a professional politician--in 2010, Mayor Reed appointed him the City's Chief Operating Officer overseeing all city operating departments, helping build a better-trained and larger police department, and guided the city to a financially-sound operating position.



John Eaves is 55 years old, African-American, and lives in southwest Atlanta. He is serving his third four-year term as Chairman of the Fulton County Commission, where he has transformed the criminal justice system, presided over the resurrection of Grady Memorial Hospital, and protected Atlanta homeowners by implementing a freeze on property tax assessments

#### **Candidate Profiles**



Kwanza Hall is 46 years old, African-American, and lives in the Martin Luther King Historic District. Representing one of Atlanta's most diverse communities on the City Council for the past twelve years, he has been working to improve neighborhoods and ensure our city's economic, cultural, and health benefits accrue to people of all income levels and backgrounds.



Cathy Woolard is 60 years old, white, and lives in the Glenwood Park neighborhood. The first woman and openly gay person to be elected Atlanta City Council President, she championed the Atlanta Belt-Line, and personally led the City Council to pass the state's only comprehensive civil rights bill.




Keisha Lance Bottoms is African-American, an attorney, and lives in southwest Atlanta. As a member of the City Council for the past eight years, she has led the effort to reform the city's pension system, put more cops on the street without raising taxes, and spearheaded the planned redevelopment transition of Turner Field.




Ceasar Mitchell is 48 years old, African-American, an attorney, and lives in the historic West End community. As President of the Atlanta City Council for the past eight years, his leadership helped to restore fiscal stability, improve community services and attract new business investments that have created good jobs and economic opportunities for residents and small businesses.



## Segmenting the Electorate Identifying the Swing Voters

- ✓ Three in ten (31%) survey respondents are "swing" voters always undecided or changing their vote after hearing the candidate profiles.
- ✓ The most important demographic characteristic of swing voters is that they are younger, which in an odd-year city year election means voters under 50 years old.
- ✓ Also, men regardless of race or party affiliation comprise a larger share of the swing vote.
- ✓ Swing voters are more likely to live in the Central/Intown and Central/West areas – specifically Council Districts 4, 6 and 7.
- ✓ Swing voters top concerns are traffic congestion, education, crime/public safety, and corruption in city government
